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CONTRACTORS AND MDAs OF GOVERNMENT; REGULATORY REQUIREMENTS FOR CONTRACT AWARD

1. INTRODUCTION

- Contextually, "Contractor" is any registered company, partnership, individual, sole proprietor, joint venture or any other legal entity conducting business which has or intends to have a procurement agreement with a procuring entity like government, its ministries and agent.
- Contractor includes suppliers, consultants and any other person providing goods and or services as an independent contractor by whatever title or name.
- "MDAs of Government" here means Ministries, Departments and Agencies of government.
- "Government" in our context is limited to Federal government of Nigeria and expressly excludes state and local governments.
- Government through laws, regulations and policies regulate business and other engagements in Nigeria.

2. WHO CAN TRADE WITH GOVERNMENT?

 There are only two classes of persons that can trade with government. The first person is a Human Being while the second person is a Legal/Corporate Beings (registered business).

i. NATURAL/HUMAN BEINGS

- All human beings except those that are minors (below 18), insane or bankrupt are allowed to contract and transact in Nigeria. Nigerians and foreigners are at liberty to transact and deal with government providing goods and or services.
- Hence, registered and unregistered business names, partnerships and trading names can trade with government because they are considered and treated in the names, status and shadows of their owners.

WHO CAN TRADE WITH GOVERNMENT? Cont'd.

ii. LEGAL/CORPORATE BEINGS

- Our laws recognise and deem registered companies whether private or public companies as legal beings that can sue and sued like human beings.
- Legal beings can relate and contract business, own and manage business, acquire and own lands, give and borrow money among other things. Registered companies have all the powers of a natural person of full capacity.

3. HOW TO TRADE WITH GOVERNMENT?

- Trading with government demands some regulatory compliance of laws and regulations. MDAs ensure that regulatory laws are enforced by demanding compliance from all companies, individuals and contractors desirous to do business with government.
- Regulatory compliances often demanded by government include; tax, levies, registration and compliance certificates. Presentation of proof of regulatory compliances, proficiency, skills, experience and financial ability among other things qualify contractors to bid for contract with government.

4. LAWS FOR GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS

i. Public Procurement Act (PPA)

- Single most important and supervising law for trading and doing business with Nigerian government is the Bureau of Public Procurement.
- Bureau of Public Procurement Act commenced on 4th June, 2007 establishing, The National Council on Public Procurement and the Bureau of Public Procurement as the regulatory authorities responsible for the monitoring and oversight of public procurement, harmonizing the existing government policies and practices among other things.
- Primarily the Bureau regulates procurement and procurement process in government and its agencies. Kindly note that, most states of the Federation have State Public Procurement laws.

A. ROLE OF THE PUBLIC PROCUREMENT ACT AND THE BUREAU OF PUBLIC PROCUREMENT IN GOVERNMENT CONTRACTS.

- 1. The Public Procurement Act (PPA) established the Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP).
- 2. The Bureau superintends over procurement of goods and services by government and its agencies in Nigeria.
- The PPA applies to all federal government, ministries, departments, agencies and parastatal.
- 4. PPA also applies to any other entities outside those mentioned above that derives at least 38% of the funds appropriated for procurement by it from the federal government's share of the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

- 5. PPA does not cover special goods, works and services involving national security and national defence unless the express approval of President was obtained.
- 6. BPP sets a thresholds for approval of award of contract
- 7. PPA allows government and its agencies to apply to BPP for "Certificate of 'No Objection' to Contract Award" before any procedure for contract award is commenced.
- 8. BPP sets regulations, guidelines and the conditions precedent for the award of Certificate of "No Objection" to government agencies.
- 9. Any procurement purported to be awarded without a "Certificate of 'No Objection' to Contract Award" duly issued by the BPP is invalid, null and void.
- 10. BPP is to ensure that all contract procedures and biddings are open, competitive, transparent, timely, equitable, and accountable, ensuring value for money, promoting competition, economy and efficiency in conformity with the PPA and regulations.

- 11. Legal persons and naturals persons or combination of same can jointly and severally seek for contracts and will also be jointly and severally held responsible for the non-performance and improper performance of such contractor.
- 12. Contractors willing to bid for contracts in addition to any requirement contained in any call for bids, must possess the following;
 - Proof of Professional and Technical qualifications, financial capability, equipment and other relevant infrastructure, adequate personnel and legal capacity to enter into the procurement contract.
 - Proof of payment of necessary taxes, pensions and social security contributions
 - An affidavit disclosing whether or not any officer of the relevant committees of the relevant government agency or BPP is a former or present director, shareholder or has any pecuniary interest in the contractor and confirm that all information presented in its bid are true and correct in all particulars.

- 13. Contractors willing to bid for contracts in addition to any requirement contained in any call for bids or shown above, must ensure that;
- None of its directors has been convicted in any country for any criminal offence relating to fraud or financial impropriety or criminal misrepresentation or falsification of facts relating to any matter.
- Its company is not in receivership, the subject of any form of insolvency or bankruptcy proceedings
- 14. BPP and any government agency seeking to award contracts may unilaterally exclude a contractor from any bidding and contracting procedures of a contract if it findings evidence that such contractor lacks any of the above listed information or is corrupts, giving or promising to give gift to BPP staff or that of relevant government agency in order to influence any action, or decision making of such institution.

B. REGISTRATION OF CONTRACTORS WITH THE BUREAU OF PUBLIC PROCUREMENT

- The Bureau of Public Procurement (BPP) maintains national database of contractors working or willing to work with government and its agencies.
- Upon registration with BPP, the bureau issues a issues an Interim Registration Report (IRR). After issuance of IRR, BPP may issue a certificate of registration to such contractor after verification of information provided by contractor. Proof of registration with the Database of BPP is part of requirements for bidding of government contracts. IRR is still a valid as evidence of registration in the BPP's Database. Hence, where a Certificate of Registration is not ready, a contractor can submit its IRR in bidding for contract.

Requirements for registration in the National Database of contractors include;

- Company Registration Details
- Proof of payment of relevant tax/ Company Tax Compliance certificate
- Employee Pension Compliance Information (this does not apply where a contract has less than 3 staff)
- Industrial Training Fund Certificate (this does not apply where a contract has not more than 5 staff or annual turnover of 50 Million Naira)
- Business Category Information
- Professional Body Regulatory Information (For Services Companies only)
- Manufacturer Representation Information (For Goods category only)
- Business Classification Information
- Company Key personnel Information

C. CURRENT AFFAIRS ON PUBLIC PROCUREMENT ACT

- There are calls for amendment of the Public Procurement Act. Some bills at different lawmaking stages seeking to amend part of the PPA, are;
- Public Procurement Act 2007 (Amend.) Bill, 2016 sponsored by Hon Oluwole Oke (HB 475);
- Public Procurement Act (Amend) Bill, 2016 sponsored by Sen. Sam Egwu (SB 232); and
- Public Procurement Act 2004 (Amend.) Bill sponsored by Hon. Abbas Tajudeen (HB 541).

- Apart from the Public Procurement Act, there are other laws setting standards expected of persons (contractors) doing or willing to trade with government of Nigeria.
- Some other specific laws with regulatory compliances needed to trade with government includes;
